ANNUAL LECTURE

Speaker: Sohail Husain - Beyond Beliefs: One family's incredible story

Sohail shares his family's compelling and extraordinary story and how he uncovered it during six years' of research. SPEAKER'S CORNER - review of September's talk:

Speaker: Graham Short - My Life as a Micro-Artist

Leaving school without any qualifications, Graham's first job was emptying mousetraps in a Birmingham factory. Within seven years he had secured a client list that included Buckingham Palace and all the other Royal residences, 10 Downing Street, Harrods, Fortnum & Mason plus high end French parfumiers.



Working from midnight to 5 a.m. in Birmingham's Jewellery Quarter to avoid vibration from passing traffic, he takes potassium, magnesium and beta blockers during the night to lower his heart rate to 20 beats per minute. Then, wearing a stethoscope, he monitors his heart and begins to engrave using micro-fine needles - between heartbeats! Every three months he has Botox

injections into his eyelids to ensure there is no movement in eye nerves and muscles while he works.

Graham amused the audience with tales about the celebrities he has met and worked with such as Ronnie Barker, Neil Armstrong, Uri Geller, Stephen Fry, Kim Kardashian, Simon Rattle and the Royals.

Graham is now considered to be one of the most talented artists in the world. His completed micro-masterpieces such as the Lord's Prayer on the head of a gold pin, are collected by fine-art enthusiasts and housed in some of the world's most desirable homes, galleries and museums.



FUTURE LIVES - PLANNING FOR LATER LIFE

Future Lives is a UK-wide u3a group aimed at providing information and resources about how we can improve our future lives.

How can we add life to our years and maintain our independence and quality of life for as long as possible?

National u3a are holding a series of free online talks to help answer that question; "Planning for Later Life without "Someone You Trust" takes place on Tuesday 22nd October.

We are encouraged to make Lasting Powers of Attorney (LPAs) so that "someone we trust" can manage our affairs if or when we lose mental capacity. But what happens if we have no family or close friends – or no-one willing to act for us? Or if we have a "same generation" partner or close friend but no "next generation" support?

This talk will show how we can plan for later life without "someone we trust"; what we can do now; where there may be gaps; how and when the State steps in if we don't plan and what innovations we might want to see in the future.

ARCHAEOLOGY WENT TO THE COTSWOLDS

Members of the Archaeology Group recently spent four days visiting the archaeological sites of the Cotswolds. Starting at the remains of the Roman villa and mosaic at Littlecote House, the group then proceeded to Cirencester - our base for the next three days. The weather was kind and a visit to the Cirencester Roman amphitheatre, Querns long-barrow and the Cirencester obelisk- all in close proximity, rounded off a pleasant evening.



Day 2 - a guided tour of Chedworth Roman Villa was followed by a visit to the enigmatic Rollright stones - a stone circle made of oolitic limestone, sculpted by weathering into fantastical shapes. On the same site is a portal dolman burial chamber known as the Whispering Knights. Legend has it that the Knights are plotting against the King. The King Stone is sited across the road overlooking the valley across to the village of Long Compton.

Day 3 - Cirencester has a fantastic museum named after the Roman name of the town-Corinium. It contains an extensive range of collections charting the history of the area. The afternoon activity was optional: a guided walk of Cirencester or free time.

Day 4 - We say farewell to Cirencester but take the opportunity to visit the Devizes Museum. An excellent museum with artefacts from all over Wiltshire and the Stonehenge landscape. Positive feedback of the trip was much appreciated and I'm already planning our next trip.

1st (1870) First official issue of the post card in Britain by the Post Office, together with

the introduction of the halfpenny postage stamp.

1st (2000) Last commercial Hovercraft flight across the English Channel.

2nd (1925) First London red bus went into service in the city.
3rd (1906) S.O.S. established as an international distress signal.

3rd (1959) First use of the postcode in Britain at Norwich.

8th (1965) Opening of the Post Office Tower in Maple Street, London

10th (1881) The Savoy Theatre in London – Britain's first public building to be lit by

electricity – opened with Gilbert & Sullivan's "Patience"

12th (1948) First Morris Minor family car was built at Cowley in Oxford

16th (1958) "Blue Peter" first broadcast on BBC.

25th St. Crispin's Day – patron saint of shoemakers

31st Halloween (Eve of All Hallows). Thought to be the one night of the year when

ghosts, witches and fairies are especially active.

Punkie Night is a local halloween Somerset tradition originating in Hinton St. George. Local children parade through the village streets in costumes, swinging their "punkies" (a hollowed out pumpkin, turnip or mangel-wurzel with a light inside), chanting the traditional Punkie Night Song and collecting money for charity along the way. The parade is led by the Punkie King and

Queen.

OCTOBER SNIPPETS

(From "The Almanac" by Lia Leendertz and "Project Britain" by Mandy Barrow)

Gardening by the moon:

 $3^{rd} - 10^{th}$ October (new moon to first quarter)

The waxing moon is associated with rising vitality and upward growth. Towards the end of this phase plant and sow anything that develops crops above ground. Prepare for growth.

11th – 17th October (until 12:26) (first quarter to full moon)

This is the best time for sowing crops that develop above ground – but is bad for root crops. Pot up or plant out seedlings and young plants. Take cuttings and make grafts but avoid all other pruning.

17th (from 12:26) – 24th October (full moon to last quarter)

A "drawing down" energy. This phase is a good time for sowing and planting any crops that develop below ground – root crops, bulbs and perennials.

24th October – 1st November (last quarter to new moon)

A dormant period with low sap and poor growth. Do not sow or plant. A good time though for pruning while sap is slowed. Weeding now will check growth well. Harvest any crops for storage.

A recent change in the eligibility rules for the Winter Fuel Payment means you will only receive this payment if you get certain benefits, including Pension Credit. However, many people are either not aware of Pension Credit or do not know how to find out if they are eligible for it.

The National Archives hold one such product . . .

Made by the Medical Battery Company, the "Electropathic Belt" claimed it could cure a whole host of maladies as well as imparting "new life and vigour" on the wearer. However it wasn't long before its efficacy was brought into question – cue sighs of relief all round!
