SPEAKER'S CORNER - review of October's talk:

Speaker: Nigel Linger - Nelson - the last farewell

Nigel Linger returned in his capacity as Chairman of the Portsmouth Royal Dockyard's Historical Trust to give a talk on "Nelson – the Last Farewell".

Eighty plus members were in attendance to hear about Nelson's journey in September 1805 by coach and horses from the home he shared with the Hamiltons in Surrey to the George Hotel in Portsmouth.

But there was little time for resting. After a quick breakfast, Nelson was on the move again, this time to the Dockyard to pay a courtesy call on Commissioner Saxton and then back to the George before noon. There he was joined by two members of the Government - George Rose, the President of the Board of Trade, and George Canning, the Treasurer of the Navy, who had come to wish him God-speed and to authorise £250,000 to be taken to the Governor of Malta (in excess of £27 million today).



By now, news of his arrival had spread, and a large crowd had gathered in the narrow streets outside the hotel. The usual point of embarkation for officers was at the Sally Port, just a few hundred yards away at the seaward end of the High Street. But the crowd was so dense that a passage through would be difficult and so it was decided to take an alternative route.

Leaving the hotel by a back door onto Penny Street, Nelson then turned left into Green Row (now Pembroke Street). However, whatever he did, he could not avoid those who had gathered to see him depart. He stepped upon his barge to three massive cheers to which he lifted his hat and, turning to his friend Captain Hardy, said "I had their huzzas before, I have their hearts now."

Overall, a poignant and fitting tribute to perhaps England's greatest hero.



NOVEMBER DATES

(From "*The Almanac*" by Lia Leendertz and "*Project Britain*" by Mandy Barrow)

2nd (1896) First motor insurance policies were issued in Britain. They excluded damage caused by frightened horses.

Guy Fawkes Night – also known as Bonfire Night. The day in 1605 that Parliament was saved from being blown up by said Guy Fawkes. In the "days of yore" celebrations were heard throughout the day, with bells ringing, cannons firing and beer flowing. Nowadays the custom centres around large bonfires and firework displays.

7th (1783) Last public hanging in England – forger John Austin was hanged at Tyburn, near where Marble Arch now stands.

8th (1974) The world famous fruit and vegetable market at Covent Garden in London closed after existing for more than 300 years.

11th Martinmas Day – the Feast of St. Martin was a time for celebrations with great feasts and hiring fairs at which farm labourers would seek new posts.

Since 1918 all remnants of the old Martinmas celebrations have disappeared and the 11th is commemorated as Armistice Day.

St. Cecilia's Day – she is thought to have been a Roman maiden who was martyred in the 2nd or 3rd century. Her story is told in the *Second Nun's Tale* in Chaucer's *Canterbury Tales*. She is usually portrayed with an organ and is the patron saint of musicians and organ builders.

20th (1992) Windsor Castle was badly damaged by fire.

24th Stir-up Sunday. A traditional date to make Christmas puddings. It started in Victorian times when families would come together to get their fruit puddings stirred up, steamed and stored ahead of Christmas.

St. Catherine's Day / Catterntide. Martyred by being broken on a spiked wheel, her symbol is a wheel and Catherine Wheel fireworks are named after her.

27th (1914) Britain's first policewoman went on duty at Gratham in Lincolnshire.

30th St. Andrew's Day – Scotland's National day.

NOVEMBER SNIPPETS

(From "The Almanac" by Lia Leendertz and "Project Britain" by Mandy Barrow)

Gardening by the moon:

1st – 8th November (new moon to first quarter)

The waxing moon is associated with rising vitality and upward growth. Towards the end of this phase plant and sow anything that develops crops above ground. Prepare for growth.

 $9^{th} - 15^{th}$ November (first quarter to full moon)

This is the best time for sowing crops that develop above ground – but is bad for root crops. Take cuttings and make grafts but avoid all other pruning.

16th – 22nd November (full moon to last quarter)

A "drawing down" energy. This phase is a good time for sowing and planting any crops that develop below ground – root crops, bulbs and perennials.

23rd – 30th November (last quarter to new moon)

A dormant period with low sap and poor growth. Do not sow or plant. A good time though for pruning while sap is slowed. Weeding now will check growth well. Harvest any crops for storage. Mulch the soil.

And for those who are musically inclined – a November folk song – The Life of a Man

Traditional, arr. Richard Barnard

This song uses the cycle of the tree through the seasons as a metaphor for the life of a man, with autumn and the first frosts now upon us and the leaves withering and falling. An alternative name for this widely popular folk song is *The Fall of the Leaf*.



As I was out walking one morning at ease,
A-viewing the leaves as they hung on the trees,
They all were in motion, appearing to be,
And those that were withered, they fell from the tree.
What's the life of a man any more than the leaves?
A man has his season, so why should he grieve?
Although in this world he appears bright and gay,
Like a leaf he shall wither and soon fade away.

I saw those same leaves but a short time ago, They all were in motion, appearing to grow, When frosts came upon them and withered them all, Then the rain it did follow and down they did fall. What's the life of a man any more than the leaves? A man has his season, so why should he grieve? Although in this world he appears bright and gay, Like a leaf he shall wither and soon fade away.

If you go to the church many names you will see, Who fell from this world like the leaves from the trees. These wall murals are designed to look right-sideup when reflected off the water below.

Created by Ray Bartkus for the Lithuanian city of Marijampolè, this mural is

set alongside the river Šešupė. A bit like a *trompe l'oeil* illusion, the viewer's position changes the composition and there is an ideal spot for the optical effect in relation to the various vertical planes onto which the murals were painted.
