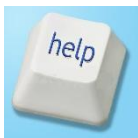

IT DROP-IN TECH HELP (PHONE, TABLET, LAPTOP)

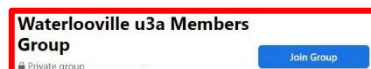

Topic : Woodland Management

Chris and her family own and manage a woodland in Clanfield with help from other people at odd times. As part of this they do various associated coppice crafts, including making charcoal and besom brooms. The woodland is ancient woodland but contains hazel coppice, some mixed woodland and some native species plantation on the ancient woodland site. This talk is about how they manage the woodland and why they do it this way.

NO LONGER WITH US

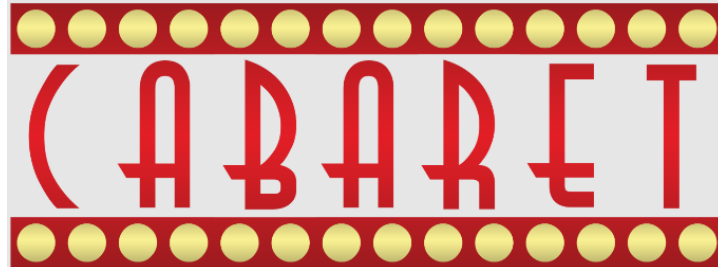

On the 1st June, fifteen of us visited Cheddar Gorge. The River Yeo sculpted the twisting gorge through carboniferous limestone then disappeared underground to create the elaborate cave system.



We were fortunate on our tour of Gough's Cave to have Meg, our Geology Guide. The cave features were spectacular and we could appreciate the length of time it took to form the calcite shapes as well as the surging power of the water to create the passages.

The adventurous few climbed Jacob's Ladder and Tower whilst the rest of us enjoyed prehistory exhibits, shops and wagtails in the River Yeo!

JULY BITS 'N' BOBS

"July, to whom the Dog star in her train, St. James gives oysters and St. Swithin rain"
(Charles Churchill, 1764)

"Bow wow, dandy fly, Brew no beer in July." (Unknown)

Deity : Sunna – This Norse goddess, sometimes called Sol, was known for her glorious mane of golden hair which framed her face like the rays of the sun.

Tree/flower : Larkspur = a flower of celebration – also known as the delphinium – signifies the beginning of summer. It is a symbol of protection and, associated with love and friendship, is a powerhouse of positive energy.

Crystals : Carnelian – bursts with positive energy and is associated with leadership and success; often worn around the neck by warriors to instil courage.

Bird : Eagle - flying higher than any other bird, the eagle's ability to soar is a lesson in perspective and reaching new heights. It teaches us to take flight, trust our intuition and look at the world from a different viewpoint.

Star signs :







CANCER 21st June to 22nd July; symbol the crab; element Water caring, intuitive, sensitive); quality Cardinal (initiating); *"I feel"*; ruling planet Moon (the memory); body parts – stomach, alimentary canal.



LEO 22nd July to 23rd August; symbol the lion; element Fire (energetic, enthusiastic, impatient); quality fixed (persevering); *"I will"*; ruling planet Sun (the heartbeat); body parts – heart, spine, back.

INTERESTING JULY DATES

- 5th Old Midsummer's Day – a time to strew yarrow across your threshold to protect yourself from evil spirits.
- 7th World Chocolate Day – you know what to do!
- 9th (1877) the All England Croquet and Lawn Tennis Club hosted the inaugural tournament with 22 men, an 11-shilling entrance fee (around £34.50 today) and an own-racquet policy. That year the final attracted an audience of 200 and Spencer Gore was the first winner of the tournament.
- 11th Witcham World Pea Shooting Championships. Competitors aim at a target one foot in diameter and surfaced with putty so that the peas stick in place on impact. Standing twelve feet away from the target, players are known to use laser sights on their shooters for accurate aim! Peas are provided by the organisers and the competitors have five shots; there are a series of knockout rounds, followed by semi-finals and a grand final.
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- 12th Grindon Hedgehog Rolling competition. Said to be the inspiration for the characters in Lewis Carroll's *Alice in Wonderland* playing croquet using flamingos as mallets and hedgehogs as balls. Nowadays the balls are large fir cones decorated hedgehog style and competitors (known as *rollers*) shepherd a hedgepig around the triangular course using a besom.
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- 21st (1837) The first London railway station – Euston – was opened.
- 31st Black Tot Day. So named after the end of the traditional Royal Navy grog ration in 1970 – the day that rum died. First introduced in 1655, the tot became known as *grog* in 1740 when the then Commander-In-Chief in the West Indies Admiral Vernon started the practice of diluting the rum rations in the hope of improving the sailors' behaviour. "Old Grog" was the Admiral's nickname – inspired by his trusty coat made from the material program.
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CALLING ALL BIKE OWNERS

The Police regularly arrange Bike Register events to provide cycle security advice and offer security marking and registration onto BikeRegister's online database :

Bike marking is a proven method to prevent the theft of bicycles. Not only does it tend to deter thieves but, should a bike be stolen, it can be marked as such on the database, providing a greater chance of returning a stolen bicycle to the rightful owner if recovered. It also helps police and retailers to identify and verify the legitimate owner of bikes that have been stolen or are being resold.
